HINTS FOR TUMBLING

Experts tell us that stones, properly chosen for hardness and thought-fully tumbled, can be polished in the tumbler alone to final readiness. Rough, broken stones, rounded beach stones, any preformed materials may be tumbled. It is important, however, that there should not be too great a variance in hardness between the stone types in each batch. Hard and soft together is not good; and stones showing four or less in the hardness scale do not show satisfactory results from tumbling.

HOW TO PROCEED

STEP 1. Fill the tumbler exactly one half full of stones. (More or less will not get best results.) Add #60 silicon carbide grit, about 1 lb. to 6 lbs. of stones, and barely cover with water. Keep your grinding mixes about like thick cream. They will thicken up after running, so check daily and add water and grit as needed.

Tumble the stones continuously until the edges have a well-rounded look. The length of time that the stones should tumble will depend on their hardness, speed of the tumbler, size and other factors. When the desired roundness is achieved, remove them from the tumbler and discard the grit. The stones should be about the desired shape because the following grinding will wear off the stones. Wash the stones and wash out the tumbler thoroughly to remove the grit. Any coarse grit particles left in the tumbler will scratch the stones. It is better to use separate cans for each grit.

HINTS FOR TUMBLING continued

- STEP 2. Proceed to tumble as before, except this time use a #220 grit. When a well-sanded look is achieved, remove the stones from the tumbler and wash as before. The #220 grit may be saved and used again for the second and third time, adding some new grit.
- STEP 3. Now use a #400 or #600 grit and tumble until the stones are as smooth as possible and have a slight shine. Wash the stones and tumbler and save the grit to be used again.
- STEP 4. Proceed as before, adding a polishing powder. Tin Oxide is the best for tumbling, as well as for hand polishing. Tumble until the stones become well polished. The longer the stones are polished, the better the polish will be. Felt squares are sometimes added to aid in the polishing. Again wash the stones and tumbler and save the polish.
- STEP 5. Now add a detergent, such as Tide, using 1/2 cup to every 3 lbs. of stones and add water to nearly cover. Tumble for 24 hours. This process adds a luster to the polished stones.

NOTE: Felt squares or wood pegs may be used in the polish.

BB shot may be used in all the grits. They are a special aid in grinding flats and concave surfaces.

Gas pressure sometimes builds up inside the tumbler so that it becomes necessary to loosen the top at least every other day. Pressure release valves may be soddered into the end of the can. The tumbler should be run from 20 to 30 RPM.

DO NOT BE IMPATIENT -- REMEMBER THE SECRET OF IT ALL IS TIME.

IMPORTANT P.S.

Don't dispose of your waste water and grit through your sewer system. This stuff clogs drains.
