

EDUCATION - Florence Hill

Mineral of the Month--- This time we take a look at greenockite, a cadmium sulphide. It is the only ore of cadmium, but the cadmium is obtained only as a byproduct of lead and zinc mining.

Crystals are very rare, very small and very interesting because of their hemimorphic hexagonal development. Greenockite is usually found as a yellow disting or other mineral, especially sphalerite and calcite. It gets its name from Greenock, Scotland where it was first found in crystal form. It is yellow to brownish red in color, about as hard as calcite, and about as heavy as hematite. Cadmium is used in electroplating, in pigments, and for low-melting point alloys. It hardens copper and makes silver tarnish resistant.

Since greenockite is a rather rare mineral, probably one we shall not often see as a specimen, we are skipping the five-minute talk at the meeting. Instead, we hope to have Martin Sotola display the identification kits used by the Adventist Youth Leaders in their rock and mineral sessions. This was prepared by Clarence Kirkby years ago. It contains samples of minerals that illustrate lustor, streak, cleavage, and other terms used in mineral identification.

Our library has in it some excellent books on rocks and minerals. Why don't you check one out? Study the text and the pictures. Then take every opportunity to look at minerals. That is the way you will learn to recognize them. Then you can put together what you find out about their formations, location and use with the specimen you see.

AND -- ethics and etiquette tell us that we never, never handle someone else's specimens without permission. Some minerals are durable. Most crystals are extremely fragile.

The Michigan Science Teachers Convention will be hald at Lansing Community College on Saturday, February 20. Again Rod Cranson has invited our Society to bring in displays. This is an opportunity for us to show a larege number of teachers how they can benefit in their classrooms and as individuals by contact with a rock club. It is good PR, not only for CML&MS but for rock clubs all over the state. Results may not be dramatic, but whatever we can do to promote interest in our hobby in worth

He was scheduled to have his colon scoped the next day, and had to be on a special diet. George Heaton showed slides of minerals and rock hunting trips. The February field trip to the Michigan Natural Storage Company gypsum mine will be Saturday, February 27. Scheduled a week later than what would be our normal field trip date so it would not conflict with the Science Teachers Convention at LCC. Many of our members may want to display at the Convention. We will meet on Saturday, February 27 at the Michigan Natural Storage Company office at 10:00 a.m. The Storage Company charges \$2.00 per person. Bring flashlights, lanterns, and spare batteries since the mine tunnels are dark. You will need hammers, chiecls and buckets or boxes to carry tools and rocks. If you collect selenite crystals, you will also need tissue paper to wrap them.

• Material to be collected includes massive gypsum in the form of "pencil ore" or alabaster for carving material and the gypsum crystals called selenite.

To get there, take I-96 to the 28th Street exit at Grand Rapids. Go West on 28th Street to Clyde Park Avenue. Turn right (North) on Clyde Park Avenue to Grandville Ave. and turn left (West). Grandville Avenue becomes Chicago Drive just west of Clyde Park. Take Chicago Drive to Judd Avenue and tmrn right (North). Take Judd Avenue to the Michigan Natural Storage Company on the right just befor the RR tracks. Allow about 1 1/2 hour driving time from Lansing. A few maps will be available at the February 18 meeting.

ABOUT BOOKS - Old and New - Florence Hill

"Rocks and Minerals", a Macmillan Field Guide by Pat Bell and David Wright, copyright date 1985, a new book last fall. This deals extensively with the geologic background of rock formation, and with field collecting. The subject matter is rocks as they are found, not exetic crystals or gemstones, and meets a real need for such a book. The key to rock types, and the excellent colored plates should be a great help in answering, "What is this rock I've picked up?"

"1001 Questions About The Mineral Kingdom", by Richard Pearl, copyright 1959, an "oldie" but a "goodie". Richard Pearl, who was a professor of geology, has written many books for the rockhound. These 1001 questions and answers range from concern with the minerals and crystals through basic rock types, uses, production methods to the rock hobby itself. Information given is essentially as true today as when the book was written. You will fine a lot of interesting information in its pages.

Central Michigan Lapidary and Mineral Society is saddened to hear of the death of member George Fuller in the first week of February.
