Unfortunately, I was not able to attend a meeting or two, but have been fully briefed thanks to our illustrious recording secretary, Mary Gowans, dear Alice Turner (who gave me so much strength) and our audacious liaison, Bettie Patterson. I am grateful to all!

Getting down to business... Because our audio system is in competition with any of our minerals in age, Richard Miller proposed the purchase of an up-to-date system. The board unanimously approved the purchase. We can expect to have it for the April meeting.

I was pleased to find a plan in the MWF Newsletter outlining the building of a "Club Case." However, it begins with the words, "part two" and then proceeds with a four page construction "map." Printed below, as copied from the Midwest Federation Newsletter, is pending government action that we surely <u>must</u> support. Please read it carefully and contact your Congressman/woman as soon as possible.

"S-729 (HR1847 passed by the U.S. House) The ALAA strongly supports this Bill. It amends the Antiquities Act to require the Secretaries of the Interior and Agriculture to promulgate regulations that establish procedures to ensure that Federal, State and local government, and the public have the right to participate in the formulation of plans relating to the declaration of a national monument on Federal land. Requires the Secretaries, prior to making any recommendations for declaration of a national monument in an area, to: (1) ensure compliance with all applicable Federal land management and environmental laws; (2) cause mineral surveys to be conducted by the Geological Survey to determine the mineral values that may be present in the area; (3) cause an assessment of the land's surface resource values to be completed and made available by the appropriate agencies; (4) identify all existing rights held on Federal land contained within such area; and (5) identify all State and private land contained within such area. Requires: (1) either Secretary, on completion of such reviews and mineral surveys, to submit to the President recommendations as to whether any area on Federal land warrants declaration as a national monument; and (2) no later than two years after the receipt of such a recommendation, the President to advise the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Representatives of the President's recommendations and provide them with maps and descriptions of the boundaries of those areas evaluated for declaration."

CALCITE ROAD TRIP - Ed Drown

A new display is on exhibit at the Hall of Ideas, Midland Center for the Arts, 1801 W. St Andrews Rd. "Calcite: A Rainbow of Rocks" from the collection of Jerry and Pam Hall is the topic - and from what I've heard they do not collect anything that could be considered "small". The Hall of Ideas is free to the public and has many good science and environment focused hands-on exhibits. An interesting display is a mock-up of a working copper mine - you even get to push the plunger on the dynamite. The exhibit will be on display until August 31, 2000.

MARCH FIELD TRIP TO ANDERSON INDIANA -- George Heaton

Fourteen of our members made the trip to the Irving Materials Inc. Quarry on Saturday, March 25th. As to be expected for a George Heaton field trip the weather was nearly perfect. It was sunny and dry with a temperature that was comfortable for collecting.

There were no blast piles in the upper level where the calcite crystals are found, but we were allowed to work the quarry wall as long as we were careful to watch out for any loose rock above us. The upper level wall is only about 10-12 feet high. We were told they only blast a couple of times a year in the upper level now. Even without any blast piles to look through a lot of calcite could be found with a little effort by stripping rock away form the face of the quarry wall. I believe all of us found quite a bit of calcite, and some very nice specimens were collected. Even George Heaton found a good amount of calcite, but about 90% of what he collected will probably end up on the Children's Table.

FIELD TRIP TO HUNTSVILLE, OHIO APRIL 22-- George Heaton

The field trip for April will be to the Duff Quarry at Huntsville Ohio on Saturday, April 22. We will meet at the quarry office at 10:00 am on Saturday morning. All field trippers must wear a hard hat, hard toed boots, and safety glasses or goggles. Tools needed are: chisels in both large and small sizes, crack hammers of 2-3 lb. size, and a pry bar and sledge hammer of 8-10 lb. size are often useful. The sledge hammer and a long pry bar can also be used as a cane to help you back to your car should you happen to injure your foot or ankle. Also don't forget wrapping paper and boxes for packing specimens. Minerals to be found include bright, lustrous pyrite crystals of unusual crystal habits, dolomite, sphalerite, calcite and fluorite.

The November-September 1987 issue of the <u>Mineralogical Record</u> has an article about Duff Quarry and it's minerals, with photos and line drawings of the various crystal habits of pyrite found there. If you do not subscribe to this journal you might check our club library.

To get to Duff Quarry, take I-75 south in Ohio to Rt. 235. Go south on Rt. 117 to Duff Quarry on your left, just before coming into Huntsville. Allow about 4 hours driving time from Lansing to Huntsville Ohio.


