

Field trips- George Heaton, Jr.

The field trip in April to Hungry Hollow near Arkona, Ontario attracted about 11 of our members. The weather was near perfect; being sunny but not too hot. Collecting was good with some of the interesting finds being blastoids found by Jim Moses and Jean Ann Pictrowski, and some small enrolled trilobites found by Jim Moses and his wife. Vickie Jacobs and others found some very small but beautiful pyritized brachiopods, gastropods and other tiny fossils. George Heaton found horn corals.

There will probably be two field trips in May.

May 21st Field Trip - Bay Port, Michiga n. On Saturday, May 21st there will be a field trip to the Wallace Stone Co. Quarry near Bay Port, Michigan. We will meet at the quarry office and enter the quarry at 10:00 A.M. The distance from Lansing to Ba y Port is approximately 150 miles. From Lansing take Rt. 69 East to I-75 at Flint. Go North on I-75 to Rt. 25 at Bay City. Take Rt. 25 East and North to Rt. 142 just south of Bay Port. Turn right (East) on Rt. 142 and go about 2 miles to Riskey Rd. and turn left on Riskey Rd. Go north on Riskey Rd. about 1 mile. You will come to a RR track and. will soon have to turn right on another road which will take you to the Quarry office. Material to be found here includes brown and irridescent calcite, pyrite, millerite, and fossils. Equipment needed includes the usual assortment of tools and safety dress. Chisels in assorted sizes from large to small, crack hammer, sledge hammer, hard hat, hard toed boots and safety glasses or goggles.

May 29th Field Trip - Bowmanville, Ontario
On Sunday, May 29th there will be a field trip to the St.
Mary's Cement Co. Quarry at Bowmanville, Ontario. This quarry
is famous for its Ordovician fossils, especially trilobites.
This is the Memorial Day week end which will allow most of us to
travel there on Saturday, visit the quarry on Sunday, and return
home on Monday.
Bowmanville is about ½ hour drive beyond Toronto on Rt. 401 so
allow about 7 hours driving time from Lansing. We expect some
members of the Scarborough, Ontario club to join us on this
excursion. Some of them are very familiar with collecting in this
quarry, and will be a great help in showing us how and where to

To get to the quarry take Rt. 401 eastbound past Toronto about ½ hour. Exit at Waverly Rd. at Bowmanville. Go south on Waverly, over RR tracks and turn right at the quarry. We will meet at the gate near the central office at 9:00 A.M.

I hope to have maps and other information available at the May Meeting. Camping facilities may be available at the Darlington Provincial Park about 15 miles west of Bowmanville. Equipment needed should include the usual assortment of chisels, crack hammers, and possibly a sledge hammer and definitely safety dress such as hard hat, hard toed boots and safety glasses or goggles.

Club Picnic - June 5th

Field Trip - Bedford, Indiana - June 10th-12th.

The June field trip will include the Bedford, Indiana Rock Swap and geode collecting at the road cut at Harrodsburg, Indiana Exit on Rt. 37. The Rock Swap is at the 4-H Fairgrounds on Rt. US 50 about 7/10 mile west of Rt. 37 near Bedford. This is at very large and interesting swap which attracts swappers from all the surrounding states. Camping is allowed on the Fairgrounds and several motels are located in Bedford. I plan to arrive in Bedford at noon on Saturday since I have an Entomological Soc. meeting on Friday. The geodes from Harrodsburg are beautiful and may contain several minerals including quartz, calcite, dolomite, millerite, barite, pyrite and sphalerite. To get to Bedford, go south on I-69 to Indianapolis, then I-465 south to Rt. 37. Go south on Rt. 37 to Bedford.


