

July 27(9:30-noon) - St. Michael's Church grounds in Grand Ledge, and area church Family Day with the emphasis on the environment; we displayed an extensive rock and mineral collection.

Aug. 18 (9:30-10:30 a.m.) - Our United Methodist Church in Portland - rock and mineral display for the Sunday School classes.

Sept. 15 (10 a.m. - 5 p.m.) - Ionia Co.s'
Bertha Brock Park & the Co. Fall Festival - Both the
Indian and the Rock & Mineral display (This was a
handful - with probably 300+ adults and children)

Sept. 25 (1 - 2:30 p.m.) - Delta Center Elem. School, Grand Ledge Schools, three 3rd grade classes, approx. 90 students and 3 adults, three sessions on rocks & minerals.

Sept. 26 (9 a.m. - 3:30 p.m.) Neff Elem. School, Gr. Ledge Schools, 10 sessions on rocks and minerals, grades 1-5, approx. 300 students and 13 adults.

Plus: I've made up and donated to Neff Elem. School 38 egg carton rock kits plus two (2) matching teahers kits, of basic rocks, minerals & two (2) fossils, consisting of quartz, quartzite, sandstone, granite, feldspar, mica, chert, conglomerate, gneiss, gypsum, Petoskey stone, petrified wood. This involved about 6 hours of gravel pit time in early September.

I am committed to doing the same for both Holbrook and Delta Center Elemmentaries in Grand Ledge.

September Field Trip - Lime City, Ohio
