

OCTOBER FIELD TRIP-- George Heaton



SEPTEMBER FIELD TRIP- George Heaton

The September field trip to the Wallace Quarry near BayPort Michigan attracted 10 of our members. There were also some people from the Flint club on a field trip. The weather was pleasantly cool but not cold which made it great for pounding on rocks without getting too hot and sweaty. There was a lot of the brown and iridescent calcite available but in mostly small vugs. I heard that Marie Lewis found a large specimen, but since I did not see it I do not know how good it was. Selenite crystals were found with the brown calcite in some specimens. George Heaton and Bill Henderson found some of these. Some fossils were also collected by Neil and Connie Snepp and Bill Henderson.

When we went to leave the quarry we found the gate closed and us locked in. Mary Bronson, the quarry secretary had told us she would leave the gate open and we were to close the gate but not lock it when we left, and she would come back later and lock the gate. George Heaton went to a nearby house and tried to phone the Bronson's home but received no answer. Some resourceful members of our group began to dig away a pile of dirt and rock piled at one end of the gate which kept cars from driving around the gate. REPORT ON OUR SUMMER FIELD TRIPS - George Heaton

Starting with our Memorial Day weekend field trip I have four summer field trips to report as follows.

1. Our Memorial Day weekend field trip was hosted by the Scarborough Ontario Gem and Mineral Club. You will remember that last year we hosted their club with a trip to the Stoneco Quarry at Lime City Ohio. This year it was their turn to give us a trip on our holiday weekend. The Scarborough Club made arrangements for us to visit the Mara Limestone Quarry at Gamebride Ontario which was well known for its Ordovician fossils, especially for its trilobites. We had ten of our club members and seven from the Scarborough Club on this trip. George Heaton found collecting rather poor. He only found boring stuff like brachiopods and gastropods. Some of the others had good Neil and Connie Snepp were the most successful with about sic good trilobites. Following our time in the quarry we met at a park in nearby Beaverton for a pot-luck picnic provided by the Scarborough Club members. As usual at these events there was lots of good food and again George Heaton did not over eat but ate just the right amount.

2. The June 17-19th field trip to Bloomington Indiana for the rock swap and geode collecting attracted about a dozen of our club members. There was lots of interesting things to see and buy at the swap and old friends to meet from other clubs. While working the road cut for geodes Neil Snepp hit his thumb with a hammer which ended his road cut collecting, so he and Connie went collecting in the creeks where they found some nice geodized fossils. George Heaton's collecting was cut short because his aunt died and he had to leave for Boyne City to attend her funeral. How the others did at their geode collecting I do not know

because I was not there to find out.

3 & 4. We had two trips to the Stoneco Quarry at Maybee Michigan on July 23 and August 27. We had only about 10 people for the July trip and about 12 for the August trip. On both trips there was no fresh material to look over and although a few good specimens were found by some, collecting for the most part was rather poor with only old rock piles to hunt over.

Besides the field trips we also had our summer pot-luck picnic hosted by Richard & Lila Stevens at their summer place on Morrison Lake and our Children's Table work party and pot-luck at Grit and Alice Turner's place where our

children's table stuff is stored.

The Morrison Lake picnic on July 30th was attended by about two dozen of our members which was enough to provide a very good selection of very good food. This event has always been popular and George Heaton again ate just the right amount of food. I wish to thank Richard and Lila Stevens for hosting this event again.

The Children's Table work party was well staffed with at least a dozen or more workers showing up. The party was hampered by heavy rain which caused a small river to flow through the garage where we worked, but we were able to finish our work and eat more good food, and again George Heaton did not over-eat, but ate just the right amount. :)
