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TOPAZ, THE NOVEMBER BIRTHSTONE

--Arthur Krave

Topaz, which next to aquamarine is the best known semi-precious gem mineral, is a good example of a rock forming silicate that owes its origin to rather unusual conditions operating when the rock was in the process of formation. Crystals of topaz are usually found in the openings or cavities in fire-formed rocks and were formed by the action of hot acid vapors rich in fluorine upon the aluminum silicates that were largely present in the feld-spars of these rocks.

The best known color among gem varieties of topaz is a lively yellow color (or wine color). Most of the wine yellow topaz comes from Brazil. Stones of a lighter yellow are from Ceylon; light green and light blue topaz is found in Russia, and light watery blue gem stones are from Japan. Colorless topaz comes from Ceylon, Russia, Japan, Mexico, Germany and the United States.

States.

The specific gravity of topaz is practically constant. It varies very

little from 3.53.
Yellow stones that might be mistaken for yellow topaz with their respective specific gravities are:

Corundum (foncy sapphire) 4.03 Quartz 2.66 Zircon 4.20

Topaz, with a hardness of 8, is one of the hardest of our gemstones.
